I now have been with my partner of over 30 years - he is the Principal Oboe of the Royal Opera House and a bit of a star - If you turn on the TV on Xmas day you will probably see him opening Don Quixote.

I think the most important lessons I have learnt over the last 60 years is to rise above the common fray (study group dynamics), ignore the bigots and don't fight them, shit happens - get over it, stay constantly motivated, never retire, music conquers demons and reinvigorates, love who you are and as many people as you can, friends are very precious
