RECOLLECTIONS OF BRSC L&MS TA [The Lams] by Col C J [Rick] Ahern TD

INTRODUCTION

GENERAL

I set out an introduction to BRSC L&MS TA in my previous recollections of the unit which covered the period from 1984 to 1986. This set of recollections cover the period from January 1987 until I retired from the Territorial Army in July 1989.

The role of the unit remained largely unchanged in that it continued to support British and Allied HQs in the defence of Europe during what later proved to be the final stages of the [first?] Cold War. The unit's establishment also remained basically unchanged.

An introductory brief to the unit was published in 1987 for the benefit of those officers who were posted into the unit, most of whom did not have any previous experience of serving in an All Arms unit like BRSC L&MS. Also, the manner in which the unit deployed on operations was significantly different from most officers' previous experience. A copy of the brief is at Annex F.

The unit's operational presence in BAOR covered the following HQs:

TRAINING COMMITMENT

The unit's training commitment was the same as that of all Territorial Army Sponsored Units – two weeks' continuous training plus two weekends, one of which was for general military training while the other was for training of a specialist nature. In addition to this commitment the unit offered many opportunities for those members who wished to participate in a wider range of military activities. Because there was a heavy demand from HQ BAOR for BRSC L&MS to support its exercises many members volunteered for additional training, both in BAOR and in the UK. In addition to attendance on military exercises this additional training took many other forms, such as adventure training, language training and to participation in exercises on Grantham's computer-controlled Command & Control Trainer [CCT].

1987

NATO WEEKEND

This weekend had been planned as a preparation for the forthcoming Ex Wintex 87 with invitations having been accepted by many foreign-based participants. However, due to fog the flight from Germany had been cancelled. Fortunately, some guest speakers managed to get to Grantham by a mixture of rail, road and cross channel ferry. Never-the-less a rapid redrafting of the training programme was necessary!

Despite the disruption the day ended with an excellent NATO Dinner Night, accompanied by musicians from 153 Regt RCT with an ear-splitting [from a distance of all of 3 feet!] performance on their bagpipes. The Ex Wintex presentations continued on the Sunday morning prior to the unit entertaining our visitors to a conducted tour of the Imperial War Museum at Duxford and dinner at the RAMC Officers' Mess at Millbank, London.

LANGUAGE WEEKEND

In preparation for deployment on Ex Wintex Lt Col Stan Spackman had organised a weekend in February of German language training at the RAEC School of Languages at Beaconsfield. This was indeed intensive with the after-dinner training continuing until 21.00. This training resumed on the Sunday morning before dispersal at lunchtime.

EX WINTEX 87

We assembled at Grantham on Saturday 28 February ready for an "O Group" briefing at 16.00. A copy of the unit's Admin Order for the exercise, including a nominal roll of attendees, is at Annex G.

The Sunday was spent in exercise preparation prior to departure at 17.30 for a night at Gateway House, RAF Brize Norton. The following morning we had an early VC 10 flight to RAF Wildenrath and were settled in our accommodation at Rheindahlen by lunchtime. There were no military commitments for the remainder of the day because it was Rosen Montag – a German national holiday and the final day of Carnival. Many of us took the opportunity to view the colourful and noisy Carnival Procession in the centre of Monchen Gladbach.

Tuesday saw us attend briefings, collect equipment, including the first-time issue to us of BRAHMS secure telephones in a briefcase. Startex had been delayed until the Wednesday [allowing the Bundeswehr participants to recover from the exertions and excesses of Rosen Montag!]. The now familiar pattern of shift working and attendance at host nation twice-daily conferences was implemented. At GTNC we found that combining the British G3 Ops and Tpt & Mov cells afforded us greater flexibility and enabled the host nation HQ to have a single point of contact with UK LOs.

On the Friday due to the tragic Zeebrugge Ferry disaster [where a fully loaded cross channel Ro-Ro ferry rolled onto its side within Zeebrugge harbour resulting in many deaths and injuries] the pace of Ex Wintex, especially at HQ RCT Comm Z, was considerably reduced. In view of the reduced exercise activity I took the opportunity to spend the second week of the training period on visits to the various British and Host Nation HQs to which BRSC L&MS staff had been deployed. This enabled me to assess the working environment in each location and to meet the host commanders across Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands.

STUDY WEEKEND & OCCASIONAL LETTER No 2

A Study Weekend was held at Grantham in June which included a Ladies Dinner Night. Occasional Letter No 2 was distributed to all members of the unit to update them on changes which had taken place during the previous year. A copy is at Annex H.

EX REFORGER 87

Ex Reforger took place during the first two weeks of September. It was a major US reinforcement exercise in which a limited number of BRSC L&MS members were involved at supporting HQs. A significant amount of road transport, including heavy armour, was involved much of which was required to cross the River Elbe on Bundeswehr Ro-Ro ferries.

Those attending were Lt Col Peter Wandless, Maj David Stevens, John Thomas and Paul Whittard at Fallingbostal, Lt Col Ray Allcock, Maj Mike Knight and Capt Eardley Brian at NTC Gouda, Lt Cols David Jones and Laurie Evanson-Goddard, Maj Alan Edwards, Howard Trundell, Mike Herbert and Frank Burton at Munster, Maj Cyril Fletcher at Dusseldorf. I attended without an exercise role so I was able to visit all of the locations at which the unit was represented and also to visit other HQs to discuss the unit's future training commitments.

1988

GERMAN LANGUAGE WEEKEND

The year started with another German language training session at the defence School of Languages at Beaconsfield.

On the Saturday we were required to produce a script for a presentation in German describing the role of the unit. This then had to be converted into a video production. Work on this project lasted until 23.30 giving us only a very short visit to the Mess bar! The video was shown to the staff on the Sunday morning where the training concluded with a critique of our linguistic and artistic abilities.

NATO WEEKEND

The Saturday training was primarily spent in learning the lessons from Ex Reforger 87, led by the US with input from representatives of the German, Dutch and Belgian military forces. BRSC L&MS also made an input into the review. For an illustration of the "fire power" that these NATO weekends attracted see page 1 of the list of attendees at Annex J.

The now traditional NATO Dinner Night included entertainment from a selection of the RCT Corps Band and the RCT Corps of Drums Black Light Show. The dinner concluded with toasts to HM the Queen followed by toasts to the presidents or the heads of state of the foreign visiting officers. A copy of Mr Vice's crib sheet is attached at Annex K.

The Sunday morning was devoted to an introduction to the forthcoming Ex Fast Buck 88. In the afternoon we took our visitors on a conducted tour of the Imperial War Museum's airfield and workshops at Duxford. This was again followed by a night at the RAMC's officers' mess at Milbank, London.

EX FAST BUCK 88

The first week was spent in refresher training with the second week on the 7-day Ex Fast Buck 88. We reported to the Air Mounting Centre at South Cerney on the Friday 5 February before a 02.00 reveille the following morning prior to travelling to RAF Lyneham for our flight to Brussels. All personnel spent the first two days based at Emblem Camp in studying the British LoC [lines of communication] plan. The Sunday afternoon included a sombre visit to the war-time prison at Breedendonk where the prisoners were held in primitive conditions and many Belgian patriots were executed. After visiting Zeebrugge and Ostend ports on the Monday those with Germany based appointments departed for Rheindahlen.

During the remainder of the first week those in Germany were briefed on the following week's Ex Fast Buck by the staff of JHQ [Joint HQ Rheindahlen] and HQ RCZ [Rear Combat Zone, Dusseldorf]. Visits were made to the depots at Bracht, 79 Railway Sqn where the ambulance trains were inspected, the depot at Recklinghausen and the training area at Sennelager.

Transport from Sennelager to Bielefeld was in two large Chinook helicopters after which there was a briefing by 1 BR Corps staff.

Saturday was an R&R day during which some of us ventured to Köln to observe the preparations for Carnival followed by an evening meal in Dusseldorf's popular Altstadt.

The second week was devoted to participation in Ex Fast Buck in the various HQs to which BRSC L&MS staff were attached. Because I had no formal role in the exercise, I was able to visit the unit's members in their exercise locations and make a social visit to VBK 34, my mobilisation location, which had moved into its new HQ in Arnsberg. I was also able to watch the Carnival Precession pass along the main streets of Dusseldorf. Our return flight was delayed for 24 hours with the RAF aircraft having been held back in Rome. We took the opportunity of the extra time to visit the Bundeswehr training camp at Vogelsang in the Eifel mountains and the nearby picturesque Monschau [Google Monschau]. Upon return to the UK we spent the Saturday night at the South Cerney Air Mounting Centre before departing for home the following morning.

This was a one-week familiarisation exercise in May arranged by HQ Comm Z for those BRSC L&MS members who had appointments in the Low Countries. This involved making visits to HQ [BR] Comm Z and HQ RCT Comm Z at Emblem; HQ BAOR Tpt & Mov, G3 Ops, G3 EPS, G3 Log Ops, GTNC at Rheindahlen; HQ [BR] RCZ at Dusseldorf; VBK 34 at Arnsberg; the Politische Bildungsstatte at Helmstedt and 4th Transcom US Army and its BRLO at Rheinberg [Frankfurt].

COMD [BR] RCZ STUDY PERIOD

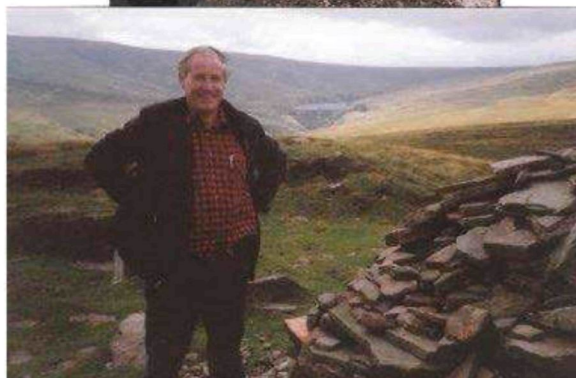
In June I represented BRSC L&MS at the RCZ Study Period in Dusseldorf. The programme involved briefings from Ops/Plans, 2 Group RCT, Tpt & Mov, Med & Ord. In addition to the briefings we visited the vehicle depot at Recklinghausen and the ordnance depot at Dulmen, the area around which was viewed from a helicopter. In the railway sidings we saw demonstrations of wagon loading, the use of a ramp wagon and toured an ambulance train before returning to Dusseldorf by special restaurant train. EX LAMS GAMBOL 2

After a break of two years, due to a severe restriction on MDTs [man training days] because of financial constraints, we had been given authority for 25 members to undertake adventurous training around Sugar Loaf mountain in South Wales based upon Cwrt-y-Gollen Camp near

Crickhowell. Saturday saw 4 teams set off from different start points to navigate routes over the mountains to a central RV, cooking their own mid-day meals on the way. An all-ranks dinner was held in the officers' mess that night.

EX FULL FLOW 88

Authority had been obtained for 15 senior officers of BRSC L&MS to participate in the Regular Army's Ex Full Flow, a Study Tour of the LoC from the docks of Zeebrugge to ABSA at Monchen Gladback, at the conclusion of which the L&MS officers were to undertake visits to various locations in Germany.

Those officers involved were Col Rick Ahern, Lt Cols Graham Shawley, Tony St Quinton, Rob Walters, Charles Milner-Williams, Bryan Barkshire, Robin Lloyd-Hughes, Peter Wandless, Majs Alistair Meldrum, John Thomas and Linda Squance.

We assembled at the port of Felixstowe on Saturday 24 September to embark on the overnight sailing to Zeebrugge. We then followed the LoC route through Belgium and the Netherlands

to Rheindahlen where we attended the Ex Full Flow briefing. The first visit on the Monday was to the Bundeswehr HQ at GTNC [German Territorial Command North] followed by a briefing at ABSA Monchen Gladback, the staging and refuelling area for UK reinforcements. Subsequent visits were made in Dusseldorf to HQ BR RCZ [Rear Combat Zone] and WBK 111. On Tuesday visits were made to VBK 32 at Dusseldorf, VBK 33 and Verk K 732 at Munster.

At the conclusion of the Munster visits BRSC L&MS left the Ex Full Flow participants to undertake its own training programme. Initially this involved moving to Winterberg where VBK 34 had made its ski hut available to the unit on an accommodation only basis. Fortunately, there was a hotel next door that provided breakfast and lunch with a wide choice of restaurants in the ski resort town for evening meals. Our first dinner was at the Bobhaus at the top of the bobsleigh run. On Wednesday an officer from VBK 34 briefed us on his unit's role and responsibilities while Sqn Ldr James briefed us on the role of 26 Liaison HQ in monitoring the activities of the Soviet SOXMIS mission. This included advice on how we could assist his unit by reporting any sightings of Soviet mission cars – all drivers carried a SOXMIS card to assist in identifying their distinctive number plates. The afternoon was spent on a map reading exercise over the local hilly terrain culminating in a visit to the resort's swimming pool after which each walking syndicate was allocated a different restaurant for their evening meal.

On Thursday our route took us via the Eder Dam [of Dambuster's fame] and the picturesque town of Goslar in the Hartz mountains before arriving at the IGB [Inner German Border] town of Helmstedt. Here we were hosted by the principal of the Politische Bildungsstätte, a Federally funded adult residential education centre. Friday morning was spent in briefings on the historical and contemporary political situation affecting West Germany and the [east] German Democratic Republic. The afternoon was spent on an escorted visit to the IGB where we observed the border fences, the obstacles and the mined approach areas and the inevitable watch [goon] towers from which we were closely watched through binoculars and photographed by the border guards. See Annex P. Our visit concluded by entertaining Dr Kurt Luders, the principal, to dinner at an attractive Helmstedt restaurant. So keen was newly posted-in Lt Col Tony St Quinton RAOC to join the BRSC L&MS that he had voluntarily accepted reversion to the rank of major; he was, though, most disappointed that his crown and pip epaulettes were not slashed from his shoulders by sword in French Foreign Legion style!

On the Saturday the main body of BRSC L&MS travelled back to Zeebrugge for the overnight sailing to Felixstowe from where they dispersed home.

I remained in BAOR for a few more days in order to recce the site on the island of Ratzburg, close to the IGB near the Baltic coast, to which the Politische Bildungsstätte was shortly to move. A cruise on the lake took us close to the eastern shore which marked the border line with its inevitable wire, fortifications and guard towers. My visit concluded with meetings at HQ BR RCZ and HQ BAOR and 79 Rly Sqn to discuss future training.

COMMANDING OFFICERS OF SPECIALIST [SPONSORED] UNITS

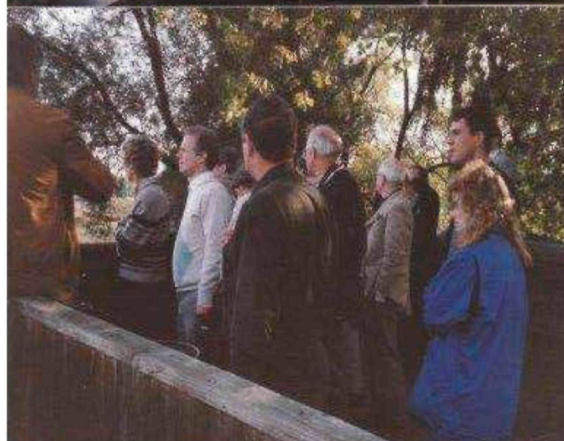

EX FIRST BASE

This was a HQ BR RCZ exercise designed to practise command, control and communication within the RCZ during the transition to war. LANGUAGE WEEKEND

Early in February the opportunity was taken to organise further German language training at the Defence School of Languages at Beaconsfield. 25 members were led through a programme devised by 3 of our own officers.

EX WINTEX 89

We assembled on Friday 24 February at Grantham for a briefing prior to an early departure the following morning. A list of participants and their exercise appointments/locations is at Annex R. Those with appointments in Germany were bussed to the AMC [Air Mounting Centre] at South Cerney. We then flew from RAF Lyneham to RAF Wildenrath and attended the first exercise briefing at Rheindahlen in the afternoon. On Sunday we attended a more detailed briefing before setting off for our exercise locations.

After setting up the combined G Ops and Mov liaison cell at GTNC [German Territorial Command North] I set off to visit the locations to which the BRSC L&MS had been deployed. My journey took me eastwards to the Bundeswehr units at Recklinghausen, Munster and Furstenau, then northwards to the US cell at Bremerhaven before going westwards back to the Dutch coast at Den Haag. I then returned to HQ BAOR for a conference on future training before resuming my visits to Belgian HQs and the US movers at Maastricht. Further visits were then made to Bundeswehr units before joining a Battlefield Tour of Ypres that had been organised by HQ RCT Comm Z. HANDOVER VISIT

In mid-May, shortly before the end of my tenure in command of BRSC L&MS, I arranged a tour of BAOR in order to introduce my successor Lt Col [Col Des] Rob Walters to the many British and Host Nation HQs and to plan for the participation of BRSC L&MS in future exercises. In all we visited 12 HQs and were reassured by the welcome that we received. There is no doubt that the military experience offered by members of BRSC L&MS was much appreciated by all of the receiving HQs.

During the middle weekend I was able to take up a generous offer from Maj Helen Homewood, a BRSC L&MS officer, to stay with her and her family in their married quarter in Berlin, where her husband was stationed. This included a sight-seeing and shopping tour of East Berlin followed by dinner at a hotel in the Eastern Sector. My travel to and from Berlin was on the British Military Berliner train.

Prior to travelling to Berlin I visited the Politische Bildungsstätte at Helmstedt to discuss with its principal an outline programme for his suggestion of a joint BR/GE reserve officers training event. This was to enable both nation's reserve officers to gain a greater understanding of their respective military roles and of the political context within which we all had to operate. Copies of relevant documents are at Annex U.

STUDY WEEKEND

The topic for the Saturday morning session consisted of a presentation by the SLO [Services Liaison Officer] from Minden on all aspects of the interface between the British military and the German civil authorities throughout Germany. The afternoon involved pistol shooting and a debrief of Ex Wintex 89, while the day finished with a Ladies Dinner Night. On the Sunday morning we received an update on the subject of terrorism in the UK. Occasional Letter No 4 [see Annex V] was issued to all members of the unit.

CONCLUSION

During the 1980s we "Cold War Warriors" were very much aware of the threat posed to the UK and its Allies by the Soviet Union and its satellite members of the Warsaw Pact in Eastern Europe – the "Orange Forces" against which we were pitched in our regular CPXs and FTXs in Germany. The state of tension was evidenced on a daily basis by the existence of the fortifications along the eastern side of the Inner German Border and particularly by The Wall in Berlin. The ongoing relationship which BRSC L&MS developed with the British HQs, the Host Nations' HQs and the US Forces' HQs created in us a sense of responsibility and practical participation in the defence of UK interests. This led to a very satisfying feeling that our service as volunteers was both appreciated and valued. On 1 July 1989 I handed over command of BRSC L&MS to my successor Colonel Rob Walters. I did so in the knowledge that the reputation of the unit had been enhanced during my 3 years in command. I am sure that I was not alone among the unit's officers in believing that we had made a significant contribution to the UK's ability to reinforce BAOR in the event of an attack by the Soviet Union. We had experienced the Cold War during the years when it was considered that the Soviet Union presented us with a real and substantial threat.

No one in the summer of 1989 could have anticipated the dramatic change that was to occur a few months later in November – the fall of the Berlin Wall, followed by the speed with which the Soviet Union disintegrated. Suddenly, the "rules" by which we had played for so many years no longer applied. The subsequent "peace dividend" led to the MoD study Options for Change and the eventual disbandment of BRSC L&MS as it had previously been constituted.

In view of the recent deterioration in UK/Russian relations it remains to be seen whether a need for a unit similar to BRSC L&MS may not be required again at some time in the future.

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BRSC L & MS - JOINING BRIEF

1. INTRODUCTION

The aim of this brief is to outline the role, composition and deployment of BRSC L & MS TA. It is an unusual Unit being a specialist one based upon HQ RCT TA Grantham but with both RCT and all arms elements. It exists to provide experienced movement control and General Staff Officers in support of British Support Command Operations.

BRSC is the HQ which commands all British personnel, equipment and installations in the British Communication Zone and the British Rear Combat Zone. It is responsible for operating the lines of communication, evacuation, reinforcement and resupply in support of 1 BR Corps.

BRSC L & MS is commanded by a full Colonel TA and the Unit comprises RCT Movement Control Officers (E1) and General Staff Officers of all cap badges (E2). The clerks and movement operators are all RCT (E1).

Personnel are deployed in Germany, the Netherlands and Belgium at various levels of command in both British and Host Nation HQs. Specific appointments are as Movement Control Officers, watchkeepers or Liaison Officers.

2. THE LOW COUNTRIES

E1 appointments in the low countries are in the Movements HQs of the respective Ministries of Defence, National Territorial Commands and Traffic Offices as well as in HQ RCT (BR) Communication Zone.

E2 appointments in the low countries are at similar levels of Host Nation and British HQs as the E1 personnel but responsible to the General Staff Branches.

The working locations are in Antwerp, Breda, Brussels, Gouda and The Hague.

3. GERMANY

E1 appointments in Germany are in HQ BRSC, 2 Group RCT and as Liaison Officers to the Movements Divisions of GTNC (German Territorial Command North), WBK (Wehrbereichskommando) II & III and the Verk K (Verkehrskommandanturen).

E2 appointments in Germany are as watchkeepers to the War Garrisons in the British RCZ or as General Staff Liaison Officers to the German Army at three levels of command. GTNC, VBK (Verteidigungsbezirkskommando) and VKK (Verteidigungskreiskommando), or as Liaison Officers to US formations.

The working locations are in Arnsberg, Bielefeld, Dortmund, Dulmen, Dusseldorf, Duisburg, Essen, Furstenau, Hannover, Koln, Munster, Recklinghausen and Rheindahlen.

4. DUTIES

WATCHKEEPERS

Watchkeepers are appointed to supplement the limited regular manpower and to enable the HQ to go to full 24 hour working.. The tasks vary according to the requirements of the HQ to which the watchkeeper is appointed.

MOVEMENTS LOs

Their tasks are to brief the Host Nation on British intentions, to monitor execution of the movement plan, to process amendments to the plan and to initiate ad hoc movements.

GENERAL STAFF LOs

Their tasks are to represent their British Sponsor HQ in the Host Nation or US HQ, to keep the Host Nation advised of British plans, to inform their British Sponsor HQ of the Host Nation's plans and to process requests for assistance.

5. UNIT LIBRARY

A Unit Library is being prepared which will contain location briefs giving all relevant information regarding each working location listed in the Units establishment. The briefs will contain details of:-

- The operational task.
- Personalities.
- Geographical data and maps.
- Personal administration information.

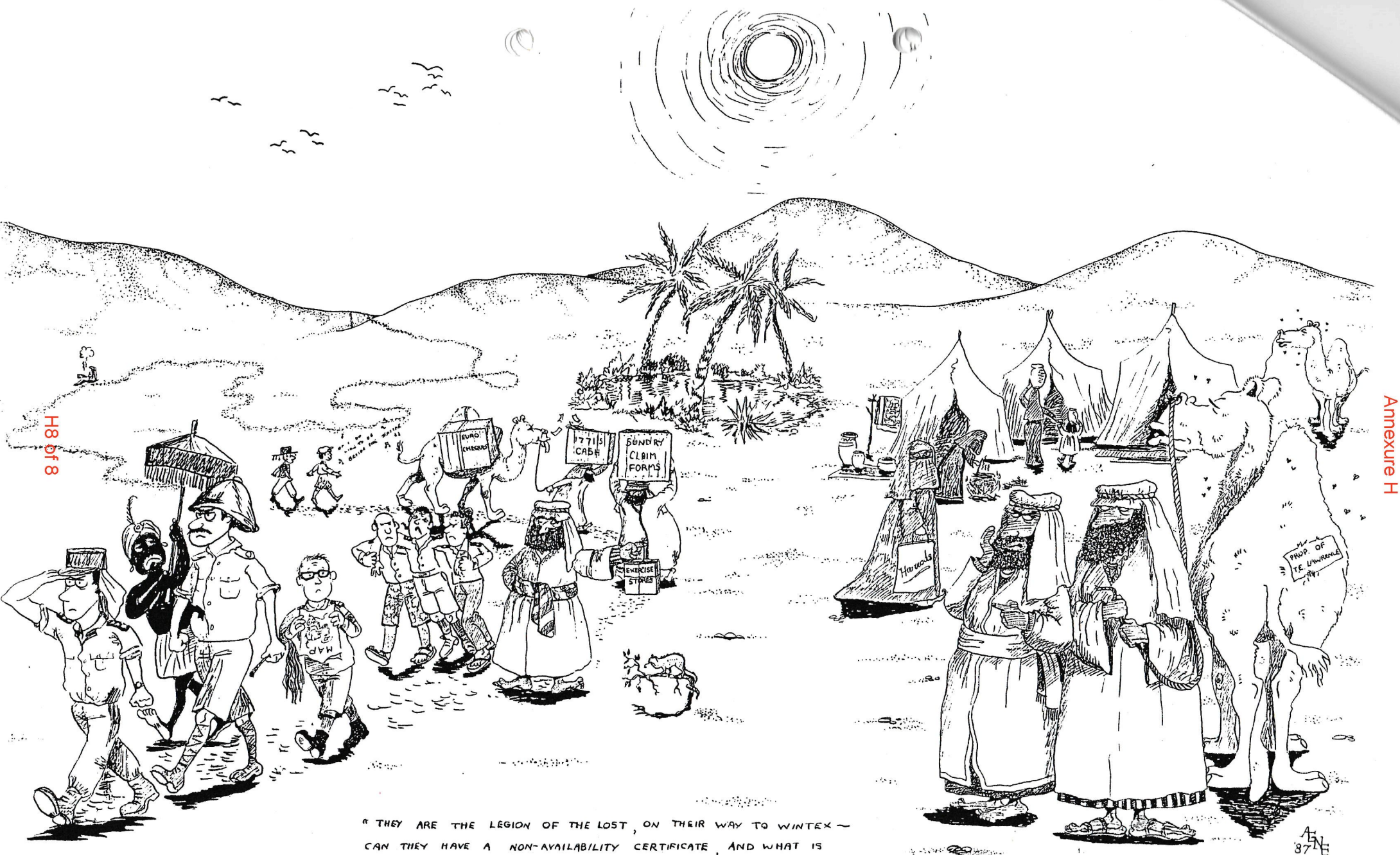

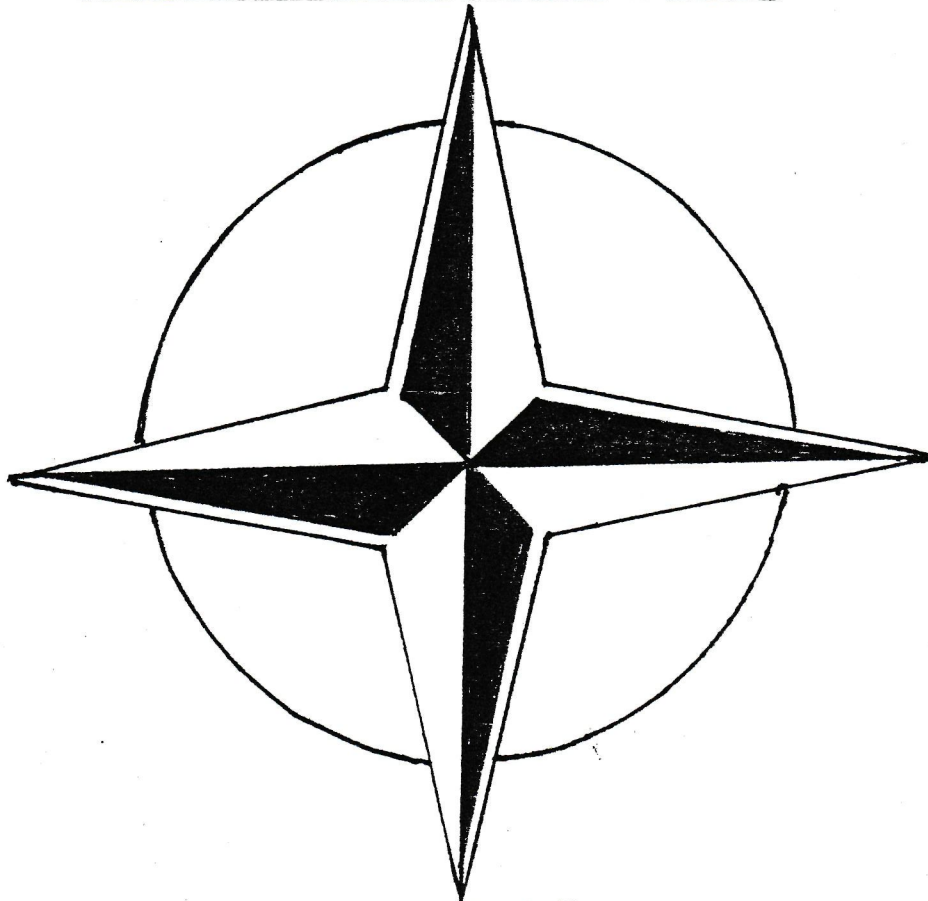

That all pervading smell, canals and waterways higher than the roads and fields. Other 'new' experiences, which I am sure many others have encountered were:

- * No longer having a staff of junior officers, Sgts and Cpls etc. on whom to rely. Self-sufficiency being the order of the day.
- * Being issued with my own personal transport (at last made the top, alas no such luck) a self drive car of doubtful vintage. For the first time in almost 20 years, I was asked, nay required to drive a military vehicle that had for so many years been Taboo.
- * Being welcomed with open arms by the Regular Army in the Low Countries. All convinced that without the 'LAMS' increment their thin line along the L of C would quickly collapse from lack of sleep and overwork.
- * Using 'Veiled Speech' on the telephone, because other means were not available. Trying to get across urgent information without giving away too much.
- * Enjoying the experience of working with officers of the Belgium Army, my hosts, who after many years in the same job were very experienced and knowledgeable and extremely helpful, when I was new to the job.

Throughout Belgium, LAMS serve in some 10 locations being a mixture of Movement and General Staff LO's. The composition and location of deployments are such that all forms and modes of transport are covered, as are all major HQ's of the Host Nation.

The will to re-unite has not left the German people. If it were different no-one would believe them.

They know that a unified Germany is only to be achieved using peaceful means and only together with their allies and neighbours – not against them.

In these endeavours the Federal Government enjoys the support of its western partners. The USA, Great Britain and France committed themselves to the following in Article 7, Paragraph 2 of the Germany Settlement from 1952:

“Until conclusion of the peace agreement negotiations the undersigned states will work together to achieve their joint target by peaceful means: a re-united Germany having an unrestricted democratic form similar to that of the Federal Republic of Germany and integrated into the European Economic Community.”

It is the target of the Federal Republic of Germany to work towards a condition of peace in Europe in which the German people can achieve free self-determination and unity again. The Federal Republic of Germany has in its political stance towards East Germany made efforts to arrive at a form of co-existence. This policy recognises that on German territory two separate independent autonomous states exist. Between them, however, does not exist a typical civil but rather a special relationship which in the interests and to the practical advantage of those on both sides of the dividing line, must be improved and extended.

Thus in 1972 the Federal Republic of West Germany and the German Democratic Republic concluded an agreement to deal with the fundamentals of this relationship. They commit themselves amongst other things to a “good neighbourly relationship”. The agreement provides the pre-requirements for further agreements, contracts and conventions with East Germany, and contains above all a settlement to regulate practical questions directly influencing people on both sides of the border.

Particularly traffic, mostly from West Germany into East Germany could be eased as a result of settlements with the German Democratic Republic. In connection with the fundamental agreement four new border crossings have been opened. Since then a simplified permission granting procedure has been introduced for West German border region inhabitants. Germans living outside of the border zones must submit themselves to a complicated procedure of application and permission when wishing to travel from Germany to Germany. The controls on the seventeen East German border crossings are very strict and not observing East German regulations often leads to excessive penalties. Inhabitants of East Germany may first travel in the Federal Republic of West Germany when they reach pensionable age (men 65, women 60) – otherwise only in the event of “urgent family matters”, e.g. the death of a close relative.

The Federal West German government is convinced that its policy of aiming at good neighbourly relations with the German Democratic Republic is at the same time a contribution to more stability in Central Europe. With its dreadful consequences the border barrier systems of the German Democratic Republic show that normal relations have still not been achieved between the two states.

The Divided Germany Information for Visitors to the Inner German Border

You are standing at the Inner German border. Perhaps at first appearances it does not seem particularly dangerous.

But since the building of the wall in Berlin on the 13th of August 1961 and the total sealing of the Inner German Border over 200 individuals from East Germany have been killed trying to flee, and many more have been injured. Mines, electrical alarm equipment, anti-vehicle ditches and barrier fencing, light barriers and finally armed East German border guards make this border practically impassable.

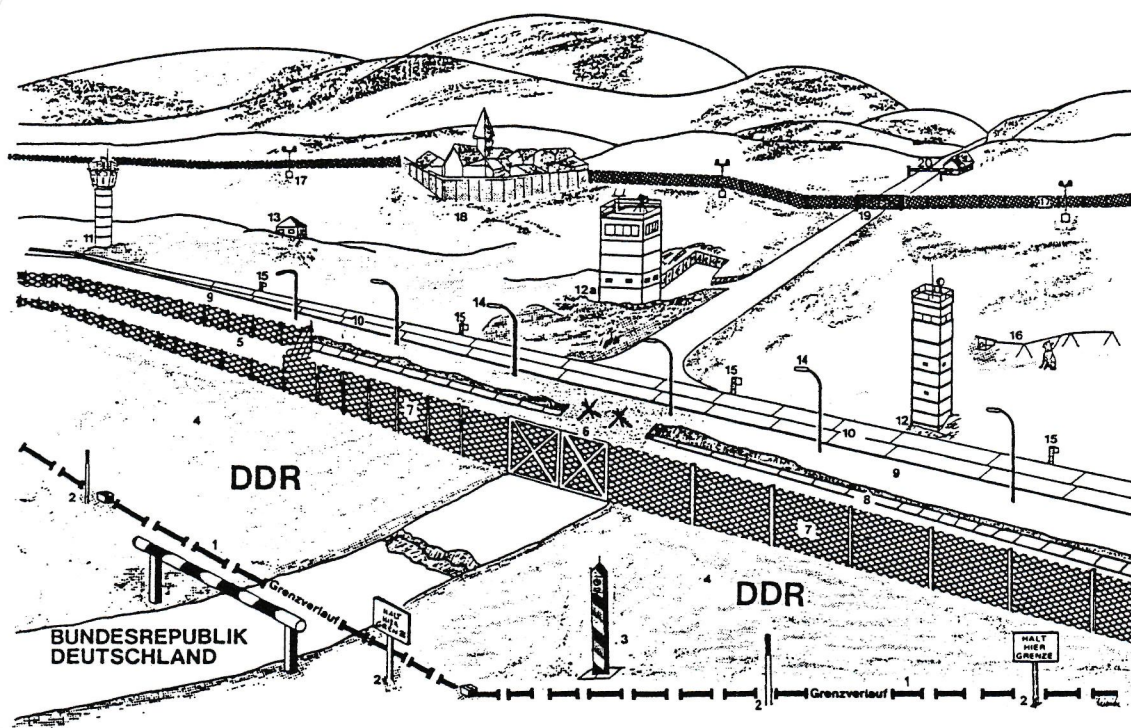
The German Democratic Republic has meanwhile dismantled the inhuman automatic firing devices. That will not, however, make the border more passable. Yet despite this inhabitants of the German Democratic Republic try again and again to cross the border despite this threat to their lives and although very few succeed.

The, for us, natural right to leave our own country is not possessed by the majority of the Germans in the German Democratic Republic. The East German Government denies them the right to cross this border into the Federal Republic of West Germany.

The border through Germany is at once the dividing line between the communist states of Central and Eastern Europe and the democracies of the western world. It divides Germany and Europe and is at the same time the dangerous seam between the two largest military blocks in the world.

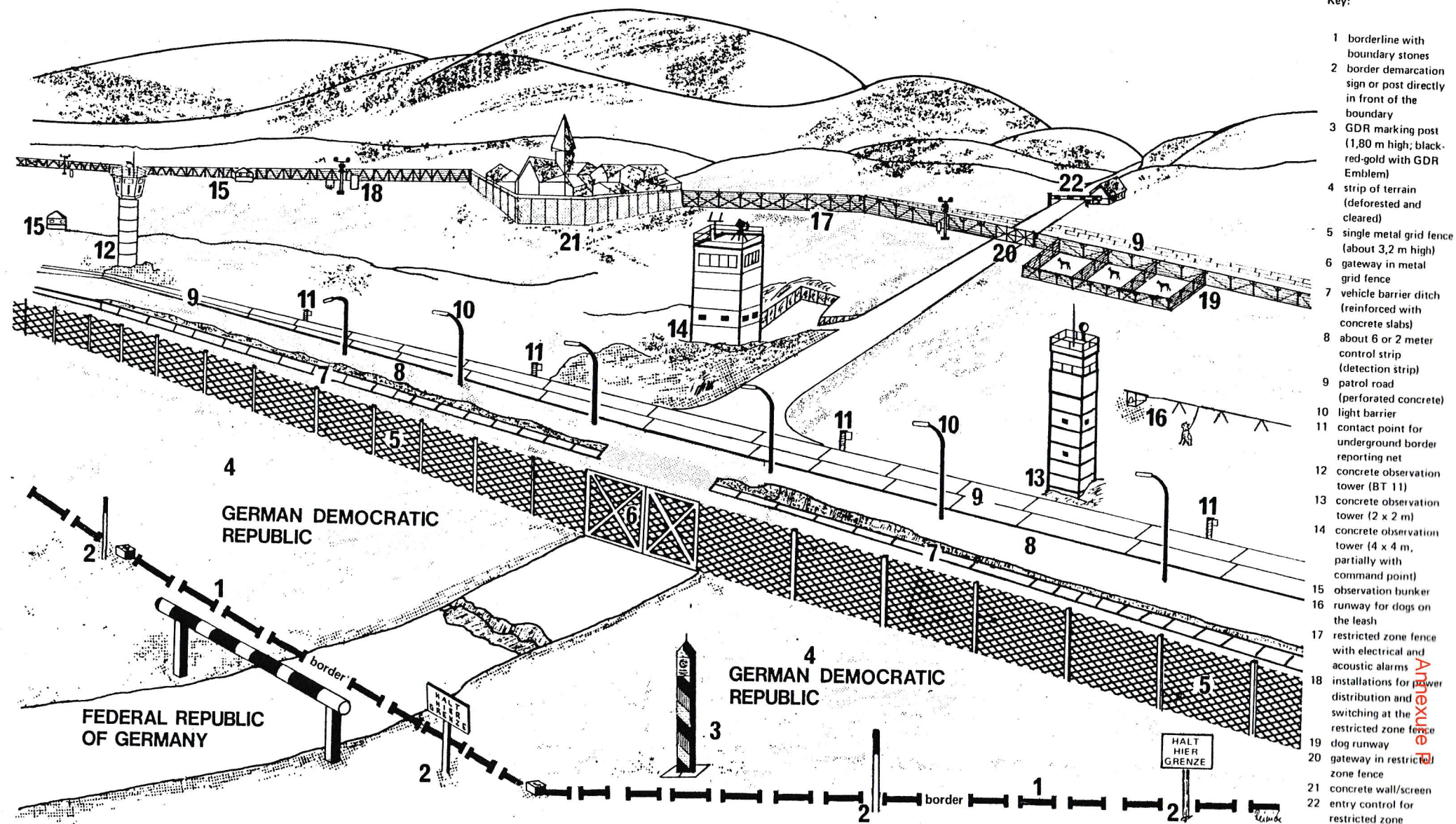

The eastern side of the Inner German Border begins deep in East German territory. Entrances to this hazard area some 5 km across are heavily guarded and it may only be entered with special permission. The Inner German Border is not controlled on the East German side by customs or police authorities but by regular marauding groups of the National People's Army of the German Democratic Republic. The barrier systems are unquestionably intended to prevent crossing of the border from the East German side.

The course of the Inner German Border can be traced back to the minutes of the meeting held in London on the 12th September, 1944 concerning future zones of occupation in Germany. That this demarcation line between the Soviets and Western Powers would produce zones of occupation cutting historically developed areas and economic links, hundred year old traffic routes and breaking up friendships and close family ties — all this could not be foreseen on the 12th September, 1944 as representatives of the USA, Great Britain and the Soviet Union agreed on the path of the demarcation line. Even today the parts of the Federal Republic of West Germany close to the border suffer economically from being caught up in the extremities of border conditions. The European Economic Community, The Federal Governments and the Local Government strive to counter these burdensome disadvantages.

BRSC L&MS SPONSORSHIP

INTRODUCTION

1. BRSC L&MS provides liaison and staff officers to both British and Host Nation HQs within Belgium, France, Germany and The Netherlands. Liaison Officers are also deployed to HQs of US Forces.

CONTROL

2. For ease of command and control the two elements of BRSC L&MS, the RCT E1 Movements Staff and the All Arms E2 General Staff, are administered by HQ RCT TA Grantham. Training in BAOR and deployment is coordinated on behalf of BAOR by Commander Tpt & Mov HQ BAOR.

SPONSORSHIP

3. The employment of BRSC L&MS falls primarily into three areas each of which is commanded by a British HQ. These are HQ BAOR, HQ (BR) CommZ and HQ (BR) RCZ. It is therefore proposed that these HQs should be responsible for receiving, briefing, employing and administering the BRSC L&MS officers and NCOs on behalf of their subordinate commands. Attached at Annex A is a copy of the BRSC L&MS establishment on which a proposed division of responsibility has been annotated.

SUPPORT

WATCHKEEPERS

4. Those personnel employed as watchkeepers supplement the existing British HQ staff and the support which they require is purely administrative and domestic.

LIAISON OFFICERS

5. The level of support required by Liaison Officers is considerably greater than that required by Watchkeepers.

6. The requirements of the Movements and the General Staff Liaison Officers are similar.

7. Attached at Annex B is a draft SOP listing the support which is required to be provided by the sponsor or sending HQ.

8. Attached at Annex C is a draft aide memoire for the guidance of Liaison Officers.

COORDINATION

9. It is recommended that the requirements of the respective employing formations, together with the administration support required from them, should be coordinated by Maj (Retd) B Stevens who in turn should liaise with Maj (Retd) N Lawson at Depot RCT TA Grantham, who is the Permanent Staff Unit Training Officer.

10. It is further recommended that upon mobilisation and for exercises, both CPX and FTX, that a small Liaison Coordination Cell be established in HQ BRSC/BSF Main. This should be manned by BRSC L&MS personnel.

11. Attend BR sponsor HQ briefings as required.
12. Provide input for HN HQ briefings.
13. Attend HN HQ briefings as required.
14. Be prepared to assist in translating BR signals into colloquial English.
15. Establish contact with BR LOs in adjacent areas.
16. Be prepared to assist with requests for HN assistance:

As you come over the last hill on the M52 motorway, you can see right across the Wye valley to the mountains of South Wales. Travelling fast that way on a Friday in April 1989, I wondered for what I was exposing the LAMS since the whole of the mountain tops were covered in snow. Later the same afternoon, driving round the back of the Brecon Beacons, I was well and truly 'whited out' in a snow storm!

Fortunately, my purpose for being in Wales that weekend was to receive the routes for the exercise with Colonel Rick Ahern, Commander British Support Command - Liaison and Movements Staff (L&MS). We spent Saturday receiving the main route for the exercise and found that the snow on top was between two and three feet deep in places. The presence of two RAF rescue helicopters hovering over the hill for much of the day was not completely reassuring, and

the pair of ravens that came back to look at us at regular intervals was definitely worrying. Nevertheless, the route was duly proved and found to be acceptable for LAMS to gambol upon, provided the snow had diminished.

The next development was a telephone call from the Commandant of Cwrt-y-Gollen Training Camp on the Thursday before the exercise was due to take place, to the effect that the camp was on full alert because of a bomb warning. Most of the units due in camp had cancelled and so we would have to provide a guard.

We had been here before; at one point on LAMS Gambol II in 1988, the guard at Cwrt-y-Gollen consisted of two lieutenant colonels and a WOII, and it was therefore decided to go ahead.

On Friday night, the LAMS duly assembled from far and wide homing in on the NAFFI. Once extracted from their refreshments, they were divided into teams and fully briefed by the author. The briefing included detailed safety precautions, although it did not quite go to the lengths of one officer who, when briefing for a previous LAMS Gambol in the Peak District, pointed out that those most at risk in bad conditions on the hill were the elderly and children. Some of the assembled no doubt felt they fell into one or other category.

The following day started cloudy but clear and, the snow having vanished, the decision was taken to go ahead on the high level route along the top of the Brecon Beacons. The teams were transported out to their start point on the north side of the Beacons and sent off at the quarter hour intervals. The first team was away at 0915 hrs. The route ran up the scarp face of the Beacons to Fan-y-Big, along the crest of the ridge and then over the hill and down to the Talybont reservoir valley.

As the first teams reached the top at Fan-y-Big, the clouds cleared and the sun came out. This allowed the teams to carry out their allotted map reading tasks in ideal conditions, and for the less pressonised also enjoy the magnificent views. Moving along the route in the opposite direction as part of the control and safety arrangements. I was very impressed with the way everyone was coping. Being a Command and Control organization this presents little opportunity for the unit to exercise in the field; our 'issue' slit trenches tend to have comforts like desks, chairs, photocopyers and fax machines. Despite the novelty of 'fresh air' teams completed a march of between 15 and 20 miles over quite difficult country well within the safety limits which had been set. Needless to say there was good humoured banker and the only injuries were the inevitable blisters.

On Saturday evening, there was an informal dinner in the officers mess at the camp which was enjoyed by all. It also gave Colonel Rick Ahern an opportunity to say farewell to the Seniors in the unit.

THE TRAINING AND ROLE OF RCT TA AMBULANCE UNITS IN BAOR

The RCT TA plays a vital role in the implementation of Casualty evacuation procedures (CASEVAC), and its contribution to the Casevac system in BAOR is often unrecognized.

The principal means of RCT TA casevac is by road vehicles ie 3 ton Land Rover Ambulances, 4 Ton Trucks and large motor coaches (10 and 12 metres with seats or stretchers).

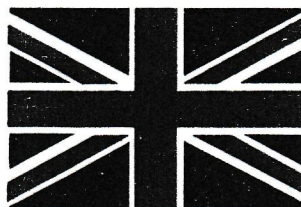
In order that the combat arms retain their mobility, ability to fight these must be an efficient and effective CASEVAC system.

Prompt treatment of the wounded is required not only to save lives, but also to ensure that the casualties are returned to their units when fit, or evacuated further to the rear for more detailed treatment.

All of the moves requiring casevac are administered and executed by RCT TA; using the most effective and efficient means, by air, land rover ambulance and ambulance coach or by rail.

In order to support this organisation and to ensure that the casualty receives the right level of medical care at the right time the RCT TA has a large commitment in BAOR. This consists of 2 Ambulance Regiments (1 Independent and 1 Specialist) together with Ambulance and Ambulance Coach Squadrons and 2 Mobile Civilian Transport Groups (MCTG).

The training standards to which the RCT TA ambulance units are committed is high. Proficiency must be shown in personal protection in NBC equipment, personal and section level weapons: On road and cross country driving: map reading to a high standard: First Aid, and an understanding of in

The British Military Train (The 'Berliner') departs from **Charlottenburg Station** in the British Sector of **West Berlin**.

On leaving, the **Funkturm** and **International Congress Centre** come into view to your right.

The train enters the "**Corridor**" at **Griebnitzsee**. "**The Wall**", look-out towers and posts, and armed uniformed personnel of the DDR can be seen to the right and left.

At **Potsdam** the engine is detached and searched and an East German Train Guard joins the train. On departure the following buildings can be seen on your right:

The **Inter-Hotel** and the ruins of the **Potsdam Palace** where the Potsdam agreement was signed on 2 August 1945.

On approaching **Werder** (at Wildpark) an engine shed where the **Kaiser's personal engine** was once housed can be seen to the right. At **Werder** (Havel) there is a **Soviet Artillery Camp** on the right.

At **Brandenburg** the oldest **shunting hump** in Germany, and one of the oldest in the world, can be seen on the right.

At **Kirchmöser** is a large **Soviet Tank Repair Workshop** and a tank training area. This is to your right. In addition a radar installation can be seen in the distance to the left.

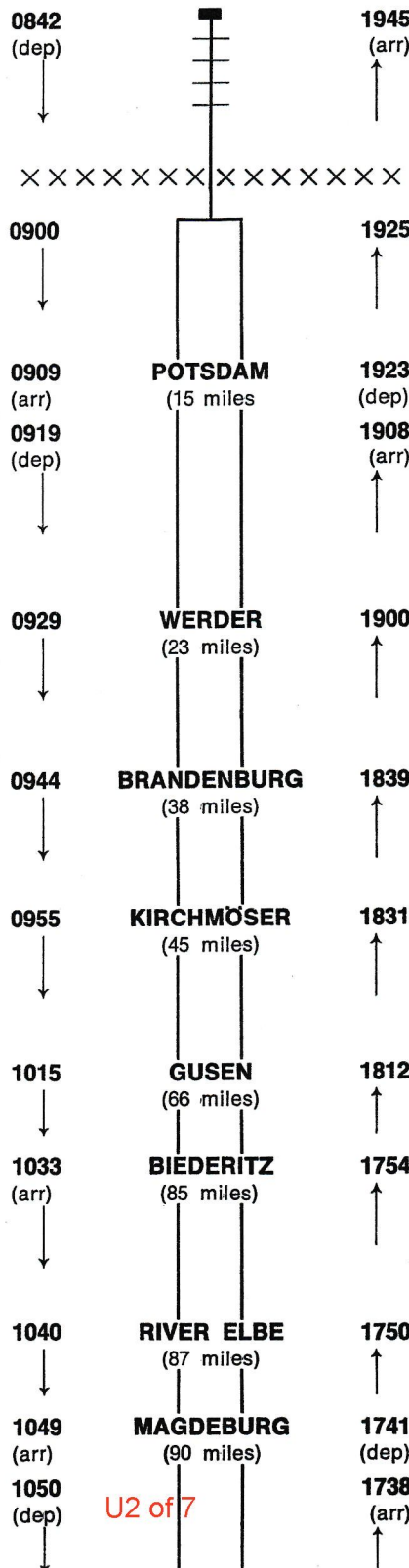
In this area tanks and armoured vehicles can sometimes be seen on manoeuvres.

On leaving **Biederitz** there is a large inscribed "rock" close to the track, under a tree, known locally as the "**Biederitz Busch**". This marks the foundation of the German Socialist State and is to your left.

Before crossing the **River Elbe** there is a large **Soviet Engineer Barracks** on your left.

In **Magdeburg** the Cathedral with its twin spires can be seen. A **prison**, believed to be for political prisoners can be seen on leaving **Magdeburg**. This is to your left.

(CHARLOTTENBURG STATION)



The sighting of the brightly lit **Funkturm** and **Congress Centre** on your left are indicative of journey's end.

The 'Berliner' arrives at Charlottenburg Station in the British Sector of West Berlin. Passengers detrain.

The train leaves the "**Corridor**" at **Griebnitzsee**. "**The Wall**", look-out towers and posts and armed uniformed personnel of the DDR can be seen to the right and left.

On approaching **Potsdam** the following can be seen on your left:

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In this area tanks and armoured vehicles can sometimes be seen on manoeuvres.

On approaching **Biederitz** there is a large inscribed "rock" close to the track, under a tree, known locally as the "**Biederitz Busch**". This marks the foundation of the German Socialist State and is to your right.

After crossing the **River Elbe** there is a large **Soviet Engineer Barracks** on your right.

On arriving at **Magdeburg** watch out for a **prison** believed to be for political prisoners, at **Magdeburg Sudenburg**. This is to your right. Also on the right is the Cathedral with its twin spires.

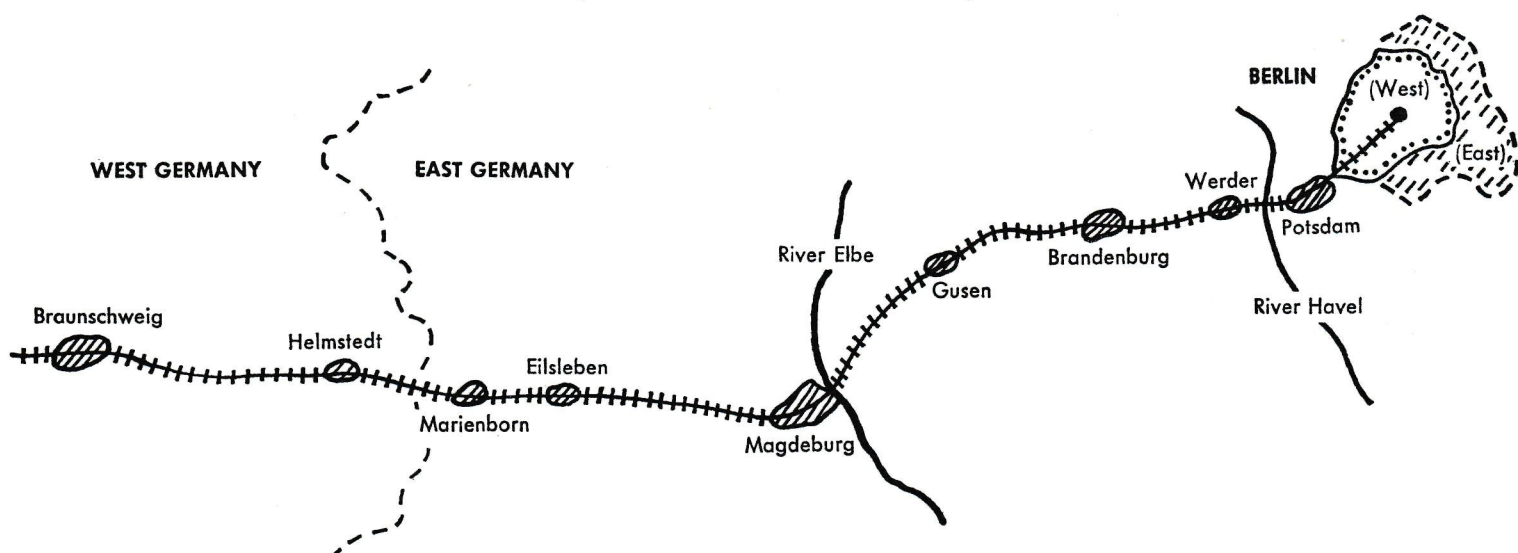
At **Helmstedt**, the last station in West Germany, the engine and the **West German Train Guard** are replaced by ones from the **East**.

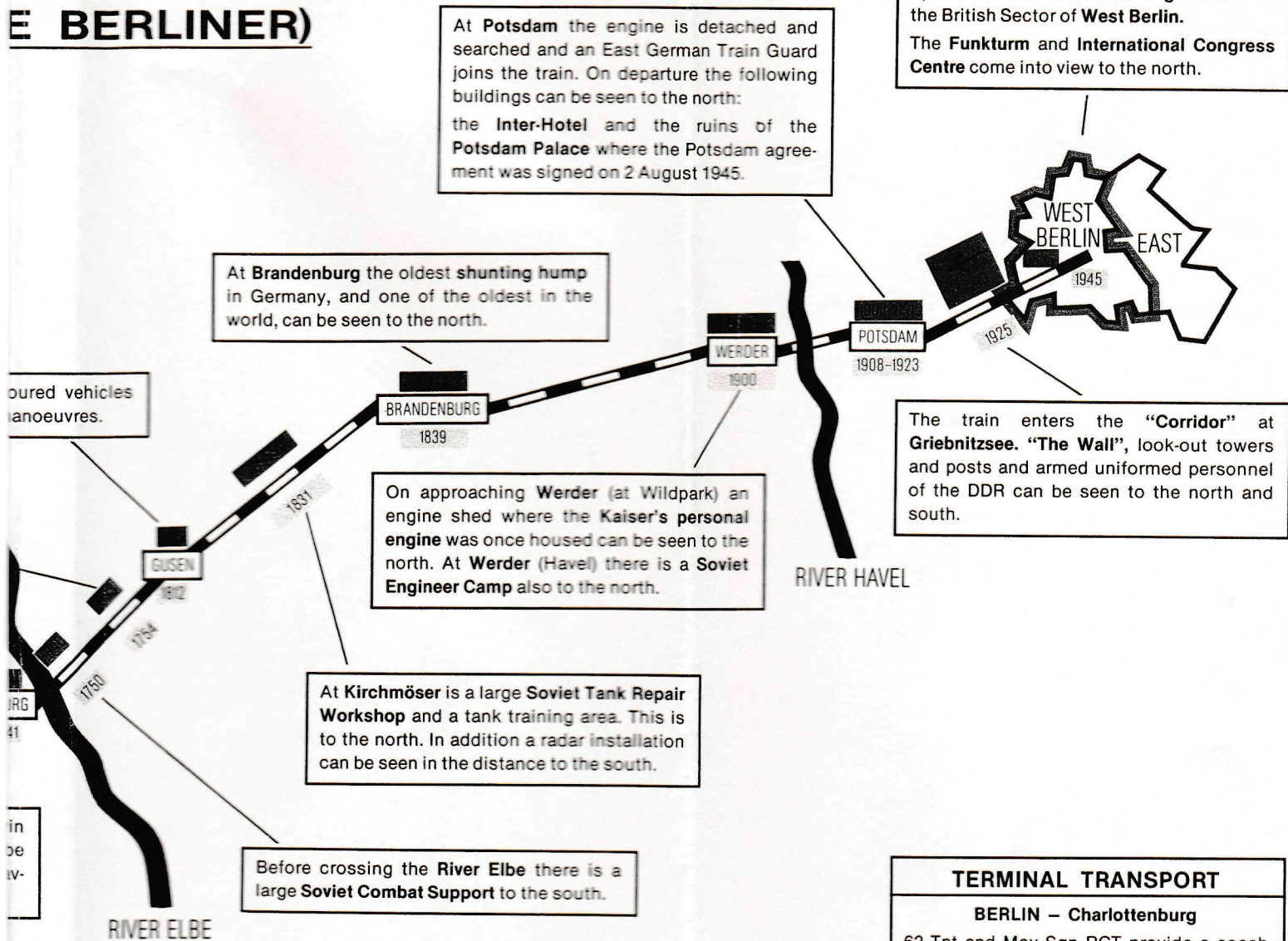

IMPORTANT

1. The following actions are prohibited:
 - a) Using cameras and binoculars between Berlin and Helmstedt;
 - b) Leaning out of the window;
 - c) Throwing anything from the train;
 - d) Speaking or attempting to converse with East German Nationals or Soviet personnel.
2. All passengers are to remain seated at all stops in East Germany.
3. Passengers are warned not to discuss any form of classified information when travelling on this train.
4.
 - a) In the event of fire being discovered shout **FIRE** repeatedly and inform patrolling guards.
 - b) Quickly move to a coach not involved in the fire and await further instruction from the TCWO Staff.
 - c) You should not leave the train unless ordered to do so by TCWO Staff.
 - d) DO NOT assemble in either the kitchen or baggage cars.



British Military Train (BMT)

The "BERLINER" is the only BRITISH military train in regular service in the world. Until October 1961 it connected with the military "CROSSED SWORDS" train which ran from HANNOVER to the HOOK OF HOLLAND. It has run continuously since 1945, every day of the year except Christmas Days and the BERLIN blockade 1948/49.

The "BERLINER" normally takes about four hours to cover the journey from BERLIN to BRAUNSCHWEIG. The train starts from CHARLOTTENBURG Station in West-BERLIN, and then stops at POTSDAM where the engine is inspected by EAST GERMAN Officials before its passage through EAST GERMANY. On your journey you will pass through BRANDENBURG, MAGDEBURG and MARIENBORN. At MARIENBORN all documents are checked at the RUSSIAN check point and the engine is once again checked by EAST GERMAN Officials. The train then passes into the GERMAN FEDERAL REPUBLIC and stops at HELMSTEDT where a WEST GERMAN engine takes over from the EAST GERMAN engine. It terminates at BRAUNSCHWEIG main station where it is prepared for its return journey to BERLIN in the afternoon.

The General Officer Commanding Berlin (British Sector) is responsible for the "BERLINER". Its operation and administration is carried out by 62 Transport and Movements Squadron RCT (BERLIN) and with the services and co-operation of both the WEST and EAST GERMAN railways. The Military Train Staff is provided by units in BERLIN and the Dining car staff by Compagnie Internationale Wagons Lits. The dining cars are victualled by Supply Depot, Ordnance Services BERLIN and NAAFI.

The BMT has a duty interpreter who may be from any regiment or corps and is attached to 2 Regiment Royal Military Police. On six days a week, there is also a member of the Berlin Postal and Courier Service, Royal Engineers. The British Military rolling stock is maintained daily by 14 (Berlin) Field Workshop REME.

The train has an Officer Commanding appointed for each journey by Headquarters Berlin Infantry Brigade. As a passenger you are responsible to him. The Train Conducting Warrant Officer (TCWO) Royal Corps of Transport is employed permanently as a member of the train staff. He is responsible for the day to day administration of the train and its passengers and would be pleased to answer any queries or deal with any travel problems that you may have.

The Officer Commanding 62 Transport and Movement Squadron RCT (BERLIN) and the Train Staff trust you enjoy your journey. If you have any suggestions to improve the service, or any complaints, please convey them to the Train Conducting Warrant Officer.
