RECOLLECTIONS OF BRSC L\&MS TA [The Lams] by Col C J [Rick] Ahern TD

## INTRODUCTION

I had been posted to 495 MCLU[V], the fore-runner of BRSC L\&MS TA, on two previous occasions. However, it was during the period 1981-1984, when I was back with 161Amb Regt RCT[V], that BRSC L\&MS TA was formed on 1 April 1983. HQ BAOR had decided that there was a requirement for an all arms reserve unit to provide General Staff liaison officers to the major allied forces' headquarters in Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands and France in times of war or serious emergency. It had been decided that this new requirement was to be achieved by creating the British Support Command Liaison and Movements Staff TA and absorbing $495 \mathrm{MCLU}[\mathrm{V}]$ into it. Although now an all arms unit this new unit was to be administered by HQ RCT TA and it was to be commanded by a volunteer full colonel. The area over which BRSC L\&MS TA was to operate stretched from the rear boundary of $1^{\text {st }}$ British Corps to the Channel ports. The HQs at which the unit was represented included:

British - HQ BAOR Rheindahlen, British Support Command Rheindahlen, HQ Comm Z Emblem, Venlo Staging Area, Rear Combat Zone Dusseldorf, Rheindahlen Garrison \& Dortmund Garrison,

German - GTNC Rheindahlen, WBK III Dusseldorf, VBK 32 Dusseldorf, VBK 33 Munster, VBK 34 Arnsberg, VKK 321 Dusseldorf, VKK 331 Munster, VKK335 Recklinghausen, VKK343 Unna, , WBK II Furstenau, Verk K 720 Hannover, Verk K 730 Essen, Verk K 731 Koln \& Verk K 732 Munster,

Belgian - MoD Brussels, FI/BS Brussels, CCCC Brussels, MCG Inter Peutie, BLT Ghent \& EMRR Antwerp,
Dutch - MoD The Hague, NTC Gouda \& NTC Breda.
French - 2 RM.
US - III Corps Maastrict \& 310 TAACOM Rheinberg.
Thus, Lt Col Brian Emery TD, then the Senior Officer of 495 MCLU[V], was appointed Commander BRSC LAMS TA and promoted to Colonel. This is thought to be the only colonel's command appointment available to a volunteer officer, except for the volunteer commanding officers of RAMC hospitals.

## 1984

## POSTING IN

On 1 April 1984 I was posted from 161 Amb Regt RCT[V] to BRSC LAMS TA to the newly created role of liaison officer to the Bundeswehr headquarters of Verteidigungsbezirkskommando 34 [Military Region Command] at Arnsberg, a town in the northern part of the Belgian Zone of Germany, close to the Mohne See [of 'Dam Busters' fame].

The establishment of BRSC LAMS TA, which in addition to the RCT now included officers from the Infantry, R Engineers, Military Police, R Sigs, RAOC, REME, Para and R Artillery, is shown at Annex A.

The role of the HQs in Germany to which British liaison officers were to be attached is explained in the instruction issued by HQ BAOR for Ex Full Flow 84, which is attached at Annex B.

## EXERCISE LIONHEART 84

This was to be the second [and last?] major FTX following along similar lines to Ex Crusader 80. The intention was to practise the reinforcement of BAOR in the face of a threat from "Orange Forces" east of the Inner German Border.

The personnel from BRSC L\&MS TA who were to be employed in Germany assembled at Grantham on Friday 7 September. After lunch on Saturday we boarded a coach for the AMC [Air Mounting Centre] that had been established at Windsor. We were then bussed to Heathrow for our British Airways flight to RAF Wildenrath and onwards to Rheindahlen for the night. Although I had expected to be employed at VBK 34 in Arnsberg [my mobilisation location] HQ BAOR decided that I was to be attached to VBK 32 at Dusseldorf because that VBK was to control the area of the river crossings over which all UK reinforcements were to be ferried.

This exercise was to be the first deployment of British liaison officers to the Bundeswehr's regional defence HQs. I made a brief visit to VBK 34 to explain the reason for my temporary exercise posting to Dusseldorf. I then reported to VBK 32 and attended briefings at that HQ, WBK III and HQ Rear Combat Zone all of which were in Dusseldorf. The remainder of the week was spent in setting up my cell in VBK 32, attending daily briefings at the relevant British and German HQs and in observing the routes and preparations being made for the river ferrying that was to commence on the second Sunday. I also visited the local German operations and movements HQs to learn about their plans for the river crossings. My visits to British HQs enabled me to brief the 12-hourly shift-change conferences at VBK 32 on the British Forces progress and their future plans.

The two river ferry crossings over the Rhein worked reasonably well although some bottlenecks were experienced and periods of no activity when refuelling delayed the convoys.

After the UK reinforcements had passed over the Rhein and headed eastwards there was no further work for me at VBK 32. I, therefore, returned to VBK 34 for two days during which I prepared a location report for use on future and managed to meet up with 161 Amb Regt RCT[V] who were based in Dortmund. This also gave me the opportunity to visit the Military Ambulance Train which was evacuating "casualties" from the General Hospitals to locations west of the Rhein.

The members of BRSC L\&MS TA re-assembled from their exercise locations to Rheindahlen on the third Saturday. We handed back the vehicles and the war boxes. We then had an evening flight from Dusseldorf to Heathrow. We reached Grantham after midnight and immediately paraded at the armoury to hand back our personal weapons.

## 1985

## NATO WEEKEND GRANTHAM

BRSC L\&MS TA had developed the practice of holding a briefing weekend prior to major exercises to receive briefings from British HQs in BAOR and from various Host Nation HQs. On this occasion we received detailed post exercise reports on Ex Crusader 84 from 9 visiting officers. These covered the lessons that had been learned and how these were to affect exercise play during Ex Wintex 85. A Regimental Dinner Night was held on the Saturday evening to which all the visiting officers were invited. Being an "all-arms" unit the band was exercised in playing all of the relevant regimental marches. Their ingenuity was tested further in finding suitable tunes to represent the foreign officers. In addition to toasting HM the Queen Mr Vice was kept busy proposing toasts to the Presidents of the visiting officers' countries.

## EXERCISE WINTEX 85

Participating on this exercise in locations in Germany were Lt Cols David Jones, Rick Ahern, Jack Butler, Majors John Thomas, George Pitcher, Gerry Last, Jack Stancombe, Cyril Fletcher, David Sewell, Alan Edwards, H Clarke-Lomas, Beresford and Capt David Hunt.

After holding an "O Group" briefing at 22.00 on Friday 1 March we departed Grantham at 05.20 on the Saturday bound for Marchwood where the plan was to cross the English Chanel on the Landing Ship Logistic [LSL] Sir Belvedere to Antwerp. However, fog at Antwerp had delayed the ship's sailing so we were bussed to Dover for the Ro-Ro ferry to Zeebrugge from where we travelled overnight by bus to Rheindahlen. Despite lack of sleep we were attending exercise briefings shortly after our arrival. The pace then slackened with the next 3 days being spent in preparation for deployment to our war locations. In my case this was to the Bundeswehr's Verteidigungs Bereich Kommando VBK 34 at Arnsberg. Because the Bundeswehr is primarily home-based military accommodation had been arranged for me at the Belgian officers' mess of $4^{\text {th }}$ Regiment de Chasseurs a Cheval.

On the Friday I set up my cell within VBK 34, tested communications, established my working schedule and waited for Startex. Because this was a solo appointment my day started early by getting to VBK 34 by 06.30 to prepare for the 07.00 briefing conference followed by a return to the Belgian Mess for breakfast. The morning was then spent at VBK 34 prior to driving to RCZ at Dusseldorf for discussions with the planning staff about UK progress and future plans. On my way back to Arnsberg I sometimes visited WBK III or one of the VKKs while making an occasional visit to HQ BAOR at Rheindahlen. I then had to return to VBK 34 by 18.30 to prepare for the 19.00 shift-change conference. Because I was then too late for a meal at the Belgian Mess I drove into Arnsberg to one of the many attractive restaurants before getting to bed by 22.00 Endex was declared at lunchtime on the second Wednesday. This gave me an opportunity for a familiarisation drive into the snow-covered mountains around Winterberg - a leave-centre town that I had stayed at during my National Service. Recovery to Rheidahlen was on the Thursday followed by a midday flight from Wildenrath to Brize Norton arriving back at Grantham at 20.30

It was upon arrival at Grantham that we learned that Lt Col Jack Butler, our LO at Munster, was to be promoted and appointed Colonel of Volunteers.

## GERMAN LANGUAGE REFRESHER COURSE \& EX PLAIN SAILING 85

The RAEC Language School at HQ BAOR had agreed to support a German refresher course for those officers who had completed the Basic course and who could make themselves available for the week prior to the start of Ex Plain Sailing. On 28 September we set off from Grantham for our flight from Manchester to RAF Wildenrath in a Hercules.

Because the language course was to be held at the Education Centre in Krefeld it had been agreed that we could be provided with a self-drive minibus. Having a free day on the Sunday we took advantage of the minibus to enjoy a cruise on a river boat from Mulheim to Kettwig on a bright sunny day. The course finished on the Friday with a course meal with our instructors at a restaurant in Dusseldorf. We were indebted to our Coca-Cola drinking driver Lt Col David Jones while the rest of us enjoyed our "bier vom fass" [beer from the barrel - often brewed on site].

Ex Plain Sailing was primarily devoted to a review of the Ex Wintex 85 PXRs [Post Exercise Reports] and to create Job Descriptions for the LO posts. I took the opportunity to visit my mobloc at VBK 34 to renew my acquaintance with the Bundeswehr officers. The final day was spent visiting the staff officers in HQ BAOR Tpt \& Mov, G3 Ops and the Bundeswehr's VKK 731 in Koln. We returned on the Saturday to the UK from RAF Wildenrath to RAF Lyneham from where we departed to our homes.

## 1986

## EX FAST BUCK 86

Ex Fast Buck 86 was another exercise in the familiar pattern the purpose of which was to practise the various HQs in the reinforcement of BAOR. We set off from Grantham at 03.00 on Saturday 8 March for our flight from RAF Lyneham to RAF Wildenrath in a Hercules ready for our initial briefing at 18.00 at HQ BAOR Rheindahlen. Sunday was spent in further briefing and setting up the cells prior to Startex at 18.00 . Because there was little exercise play involving my VBK I obtained permission to make an extended liaison visit to VBK 34 at Arnsberg which also included the VKK at Koln and an overnight visit to HQ RCT at Emblem. We flew back to the UK on the Saturday arriving at Grantham at 18.50 - just in time for dinner!

## PROMOTION

On 1 July I was promoted to Colonel and appointed Commander of BRSC L\&MS TA vice Col Brian Emery.

I convened a weekend meeting of the unit's eight Lt Cols to discuss the unit's internal organisation and to set out the responsibilities that I expected each to accept. I was only too well aware of the considerable military experience that each brought to the unit, many of whom had successfully commanded their own regiments. I wished them to be kept fully occupied!

I set out my expectations in Occasional Letter No 1 dated 3 September [at Annex C] addressed to all officers of the unit.

As an illustration of the extent of military experience contained within the unit attached at Annex D is a copy of HQ RCT TA's Manning Plot dated 1 December 1986.

I wrote an article about the Lams for the autumn edition of HQ RCT TA's in-house magazine:

# THE LAMS

## 'Who is or what are the Lams?'

It is not an uncommon question! One opinion is that it is a group of seemingly innumerable senior officers together with a sprinkling of mature Senior N.C.O.'s all being watched over by a shepherd! No doubt this version was the inspiration for Major Jack Stancombe, the Honorary Unit Artist, who produced the portrait of Colonel Brian Emery, the Unit's former Commander, which appears on the opposite page.
The Lams, or to give the Unit its proper title the British Support Command Liaison \& Movements Staff T.A., was formed in, the summer of 1983. The nucleus was provided by the former 495 Movement Control Liaison Unit and these personnel were supplemented by the transfer in of officers wearing other cap badges. In addition to RCT personnel the Unit now has the benefit of experienced officers from the following arms: R Signals, RAOC, RMP, REME, R Artillery, Infantry and the Parachute Regiment.


The role of the Lams is twofoid. The first is to provide both movements and general staff liaison officers to various levels of command within the Host Nation armies of Belgium, the Netherlands, and Germany. The second is to provide watchkeepers to British army HQs in the Communications Zone and the Rear Combat Zone. In effect it means that personnel from the Unit are deployed in HQs stretching from the Channel Ports to the rear boundary of the Forward Combat Zone. In addition we have our 'look-out man' who ventures as far forward as Hanover!

The Unit deploys to all of the major Communication Zone and Rear Combat Zone FIXs (live exercises) and CPXs (paper exercise) in support of the British and Host Nation Headquarters. The next major commitment will be in the Spring of 1987 when we will participate in Exercise Wintex. Future articles in this series will be contributed by members of the Sub Units who will describe in greater detail the nature of the tasks which have to be undertaken and they will comment on the pleasures of, and the occasional rigours of. living with a foreign army.

## EXERCISE LAMS GAMBOL 1

Because the unit when deployed was scattered across the Low Countries and Germany there was little opportunity for collective training. Fortunately, HQ RCT TA supported a request for an additional training weekend which was held in the Derbyshire Peak District based upon the training camp at Leek.

We assembled at Leek on Friday night September 10 and then set out on the Saturday with part of our 24 -hour ration packs and Hexe burners from 6 start points to traverse wild parts of the Peak District. We all enjoyed returning to civvy rations with a well-earned meal at a local pub that night.

Sunday morning was spent on a mountain top path walk prior to an early lunch and departure for home.

## MOBILISATION LOCATION RECCE 1986

This was to be a one-week tour of the unit's mobilisation locations for those officers who deployed to the Low Countries.

Immediately prior to reporting to Grantham I attended my first meeting of the TA Colonels. This was held in the officers' mess within Edinburgh Castle, with a traditional Scottish haggis lunch!

After flying back from Edinburgh I spent an hour at home before setting off for Grantham. There was only one hour to spare before we set off for Harwich to catch the overnight sailing to the Hook of Holland. After an early breakfast on board we set off for Emblem Camp, near Antwerp. Here HQ RCT Comm $Z$ had arranged a full programme of visits and briefings that included the Belgian MoD in Brussels, MC Inter, a tour of Ostend docks, the Naval base at Zeebrugge and another docks tour. After two days with the Belgians we moved on for a further two days to the Netherlands. Here we visited NL Mov HQ at The Hague, NTC at Gouda and HQ Afcent. Our return journey was another night crossing from the Hook of Holland to Harwich.

## HQ BAOR VISIT

Although I had a reasonable appreciation of the role of the BRSC L\&MS TA I had asked for a formal briefing in anticipation of the forthcoming Ex Wintex 87. Accordingly, accompanied by Col John Riggall, the ever supportive RO2 at HQ RCT TA, and Lt Col Stan Spackman, my second-in-command, we flew from Luton to RAF Wildenrath on Monday 8 December. Our day one diary included briefings by G3 Ops \& Plans, Brig Mike Betts and Col Peter French of HQ BAOR Tpt \& Mov. On Tuesday we undertook visits to HQ BR RCZ [Rear Combat Zone], 2 Group RCT and further meetings at both G3 Ops \& Plans and Tpt \& Mov at HQ BAOR.

On Wednesday we reviewed the proposed war manning establishment of the unit and discussed language training at the Higher Education Centre. On Thursday we visited GTNC in Rheindahlen Village [my mobilisation appointment] before I made a farewell overnight visit to my former liaison posting at VBK 34 in Arnsberg. On Friday, our final day, I visited VBK 33 at Munster before re-joining the others for our flight back from Dusseldorf to Luton just before midnight.

Appendix B-Role of HQs to which unit members were attached

1. General
a. WBK III is involved in the exercise with elements of its territorial Command and Control Organisation, its territorial movement control organisation, and various formations and agencies.
b. Wehrbereichsverwaltung III is involved in the exercise with exercise control groups from certain military subregion recruiting offices (Kreiswehrersatzamter) and garrison administrations.
2. Responsibilities. The territorial conmand and control organisation is responsible for command and control in its own organisational area (military command), and fulfils the support mission with regard to NaTO command authorities, the Allied Forces and Military home defence.
3. WBK III
a. Wehrbereichskommando III (WBK III) covers the Land NORTH RHINE WESTFALIA with its military district. It acts as an intermediary berween the military requirements of the Corps or the national command authorities of the forces and the nations.
b. It maintains freedom of operation and can then fall back upon other forces.
c. It is responsible for area organisation and military home defence.
d. It commands bubordinate forces and agencies and works together with HQ RCZ and other Allied command authorities.
e. For the purposes of Exercise LIONHEART, WBK III is the directing WBK.
4. VBKs
a. The Verteidigungsbezirkskommando (VBK) (military region command) in North Rhine Westfalia includes one administrative district (Regierungsbezirk).
b. It performs an intermediary role at this level. At the borders to neighbouring countries, it cooperates closely with the territorial command authorities of these countries. Its most important individual tasks are:
(1) Area and point defence.
(2) Preservation of freedom of operation.
(3) Planning of obstacles, preparation and maintenance of obstacle installations.
(4) Acquisition of intelligence.
(5) Area organisation.
(6) Support duxing damage repair.

c. The Verteidigungsbezirkskommando has at its command the Vertiedigungskreiskommandos (VKK) (military subregion command) and often a home defence regiment, demolition forces, logistic formations, and numerous liaison teams.
5. VKKs
a. The Verteidigungskreiskommando (VKK) has command in its military subregion, which may include one or several rural districts and towns constituting an administrative district on their own. It has combat troops for point defence. In addition:
(1) It operates regional information system.
(2) It receives requests for the use of civil resources.
(3) It offers advice on paychological operations and performs other tasks for its own forces.
(4) It deals with the regional security posture.
b. BR WAR GARRISONS work closely with the VKKs. Directing VKK's are commissioned for this purpose.
6. LOs. Liaison teams (Verbindungskommandos) from the territorial command and control organisation represent the interests of their own command authorities. They serve the exchange of informatinn, are supposed to take part in all presentations of the situation and thereby present the territorial situation.

## 7. Movement Control

a. The movement control organisation (Verkehrsorganisation) in the Military District consists, under the VBK, of the traffic headquarters (VerkK : Verkehrskommandanturen) and the movement control net. The directing traffic HQ for BRSC is VerkK 730, which is also responsible for river-crossing in the BRSC area of interest. The movement organisation has at its disposal the movement control conmunications network.
b. The traffic headquarters supervise, deal with an control military road and rail movements in their traffic district.
8. Military Police. Feldjagerbatalllon 730 carries out is operations with a few of its own Feldjager service commands and may support the VerkK with traffic control posts and control points in the framework of a movement control net. It works closely with Allied Military Police. In the event of war, the WBK will have several Feldjager battalins at its disposal.
9. Combat Troops. In the milltary district, the combat troops consist of home defence brigades and regiments for operations against a superior enemy and for area defence, as well as home defence companies security platoons (Sicherungszllge) for point defence. Only one hone defence company will be taking part in Exercise FULL FLOW.
10. EOD. The Explosive Ordnance Disposal (FOD) platoon of the WBK will not be taking part in the exercise. Therefore, if necessary, the Territorial Army will have to fall back on BR Forces.
11. NBC
a. WBK III's NBC defence will be invovled in the exercise in the sphere of NBC defence with:
(1) The WBK NBC collection centre.
(2) The VBK and VKK NBC reporting posts.
b. The Wehrbereichskommando will establish and assess the overall NBC situation. It will warn subordinate command authorities and provide them with weather reports via its own special communications network (telephone network).
c. The VBKs and VKKs work together with the Field Army and Allied Forces' NBC reporting posts. They will warn all endangered installations and agencies. The VKKs will allocate recognised decontamination centres to contaminated troops.
d. NBC Defence Battalion (AEC - AbwehrBtl) 730, the explosive ordnance examination centre and the NBC control party will not be taking part in the exercise.
e. The WBK NBC special commications network aims to provide troublefree telephone transfer of information regarding NBC defence between the WBK and the VBKs.
12. Damage Repair (Exercise Play NoT Real Damage)
a. Terricorial win comanders decide whether damages to infrastructure should be repatred using clvil repair resources or by the use of forces.
b. In princtple, forces themselves repair damages to their own installations and facilities, in as far as this is possible.
c. GE forces will not be taking part in the exercise. In the individual incidents detemined by the $B R$ exercise directing staff, WBK III will fall back on $B R$ damage repair forces.
13. Psychological Defence (PSV). The psychological defence staff officer from the WBK advises military commanders on assessing the psychological situation and carrying out and planning psychological operations. GTNC psychological warfare troops will not take part in Exercise FULL FLOW.

## 14. Communications

a. WB 3 communications commander provides command and control and special comms networks for the Territorial Army in WBK III. It is involved in the exercise with agencies and forces.
b. The area signals commanders subordinated to it represent the requirements of the forces as liaison agencies to the post office main administration offices of the Deutsche Bundespost. They coordinate and deal with the requests of the German and Allied requesting agencies for telephone links. They perform the functions of a Regional Long Line Agency (RELLA). They cooperate closely with Federal Post Office (BP) advisors in the Corps and Allied command authorities.

## 15. Logistics

a. Logistic formations and facilities belonging to the Territorial Army, comprising:
(1) Supply )
(2) Maintenance $)^{\text {) }}$ ) Troops
(3) Medical
(4) Depots
b. They are only involved in the exercise to a limited extent in support of German troops.
16. Geo. The WBK Military Geographic department (MilGeo) will support the Allies as required on the basis of agreements already in existence.

## 17. Host Nation Support

a. The Wehrbereichverwaltung (Military District Administration) is responsible for all administrative tasks in the military district.
b. Kreiswehrersatzémter (KWEA) (military subregion recruiting offices) and Standortverwaltungen (StOV) (garrison administrations) perform important tasks in support of the Allies and in carrying out both prepared measures and those relating to ad hoc requirements. They will take part in the exercise. Alljed Forces collaborate with the KWEA's and Stov's via the local VKK responsible.
18. GTNC (German Territorial Northern Command)
A. GTNC will be involved in the Exercise FULL FLOW with elements of its command staff as an exercise control group (RLG: Rahmenleitungsgruppe) and elements of its engineer command in the field exercise. They will be based at Ex FULL FLOW Control HQ.
b. The GINC Command Staff will form one exercise control group from the sections G2, G3 and WerkFu (movements control), and place it physically in the vicinity of the BRSC directing field HQ. The commander of PiKdo 800 (Pionierkommando $=$ engineer command) will be included.
c. This exercise control group will act as
(1) The territorial partner and equivalent German national commander in relation to BRSC and RAFG. (Elank Control)
(2) The intermediary between the WBK and the secondary $B R$ command authorities.
(3) As superior command authority for WBK III, in particular for the declaration of alert measures, and the allocation of forces and priorities.
d. In the NORTHAG area of responsibility, GTNC is the highest Germon national command authority and has equivalent powers with Com Northag.
19. Engineers
a. Pionierkommando 800 (Engr Command), in the framework of the exercisa control group of GTNC, forms the coordination cell for Allied engineers from its field $H Q$ and works together with the BRSC Engineer Commander.
b. The river engineer companies (Flusspionierkompanien), led by the crossings commander (KdtU) guarantee the crossing over the Rhine following the loss of permanent bridges.
c. No further GTNC engineer troops will take part in the exercise.

## 20. Freedom of Operations

". Collaboration with Allies in preserving the freedom of nperation. preserve freedor commander falls back on other (BR) troops in order to ordinate these troops.
b. Should it be necessary for Allied combat troops to operate outside an area with a radius of 500 m from their own installation, then they are always to be subordinated to the responsible territorial commander.

## OCCASIONAL LETTER - No 1

1. INTRODUCTION

A Unit Planning Conference, which was attended by all lieutenant colonels of the unit, was held in July. I am now writing to advise you of the decisions which were taken at that conference together with my comments on some other topics.

## 2. GENERAL

To set the scene I now quote from the first three sections of the Orders which $I$ issued at the end of the Planning Conference:SITUATION
The Unit has now completed the initial settling down period after its formation and is about to reorganise to conform to the new HQ BAOR (WAR) establishment.
MISSION
The Unit is to be organised and trained to enable it to perform its mobilisation task - and to be perceived as efficient by both British and Host Nation headquarters.
EXECUTION
To concentrate upon training for role by:
i Attendance on appropriate courses
ii Instruction by Depot RCT TA and experienced members of the unit.
iii On the job training on CPXs and FTXs
iv To supplement formal training with other training which is both relevant and interesting.
